Minneapolis, MN – The Bakken Museum is proud to announce a collaboration with The Blake School's spring semester Object-Oriented Software Design class. The class, comprised of inventive juniors and seniors, created an interactive Apple iPad app for The Bakken's Cabinet of Curiosity exhibit. Combining The Bakken's eclectic collections with innovative interactive programing, the students from The Blake School devised the perfect companion to complement this historical exhibit.

On choosing The Bakken as a partner, computer science teacher Sean Hickey said, "The best way for students to learn how to write software is by creating projects that connect them to the communities and the world they live in."

Students were challenged to not only design the app for the Apple iPad, but were also required to create it for all ages and technology skill levels. "This is the only class I may ever take where, at the end, I don't just have a grade. I have something I can put on a résumé," said Blake School student Schmitty Smith.

The Cabinet of Curiosity app is currently on display through January 2016.
